September Gardening Calendar

Approximate Dates & Gardening Activities:

- 2 There's still time to plant early fall vegetables this week, such as tomatoes, peppers, zucchini, etc.
- 4 Pull summer flower varieties and begin planting fall flowers—in-store now!
- 6 Use insect preventatives in early flowers and vegetables.
- 9 Start planting winter vegetables this week...
- 11 It's time to fertilize your citrus.
- 13 Rose care—clean up, light pruning and fertilizing.
- 16 Grow a lush winter lawn-start prepping for winter ryegrass seed.
- 18 It's a great time to plant citrus!
- 20 Landscape clean up and fertilization of trees and shrubs.
- 23 Plant select seeds indoors for your fall/winter Tasty Garden.
- 25 Winter Lawn—begin planting ryegrass seed once nighttime temperatures are a consistent 65 degrees F.

The Arizona Agave was on the endangered species list from 1984 until it was removed from the list in 2003. This summer Nancy Hicks pointed out that some of her agave's and many of her neighbors are suffering from root weevils. After she brought it to my attention, I noticed that they are all dying in my neighborhood also. She was able to find a pesticide that will kill the wee-

vils, but not all nurseries carry it. Here are 2 that were recommended in a blog about Agaves. Starla

Agave Snout Weevil (Scyphophorus acupunctatus). The adult weevil attacks many species of agave. The very large Agave americana or century plant is more susceptible to weevil damage than the smaller species. The adult weevil is about 1/2 inch (12 mm) in length, is

brownishblack and has a dull body (Fig. 16). The adult female enters the base of the plant to lay eggs. Decay microbes also enter through this injury and as the tissue rots, the plant has a wilted appearance. Infested plants soon collapse and die (Fig. 17). The larvae (grubs) develop in the dying plant and infect other hosts nearby. Agave snout weevil also infests the canes of several Yucca species. Control of the agave snout weevil is difficult. Selecting species that are less susceptible and typically smaller than the century plant is helpful, especially in areas where the problem has occurred previously. With rare or special specimens, chemical prevention using a broad-spectrum insecticide applied in spring is often effective in reducing damage.


her the "Sun Lakes Hollyhock Lady." Carol will miss the September meeting because she's preparing for her wedding anniversary party on


Butterfly Lodge Museum preserves that authentic, exciting past, recreates it in the present, so that its values may inform and its passion energize the future.
